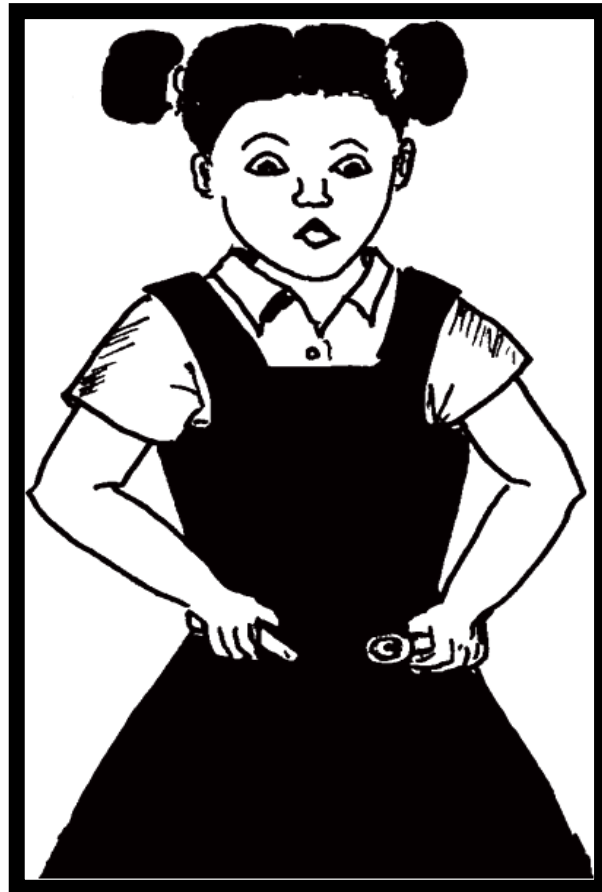
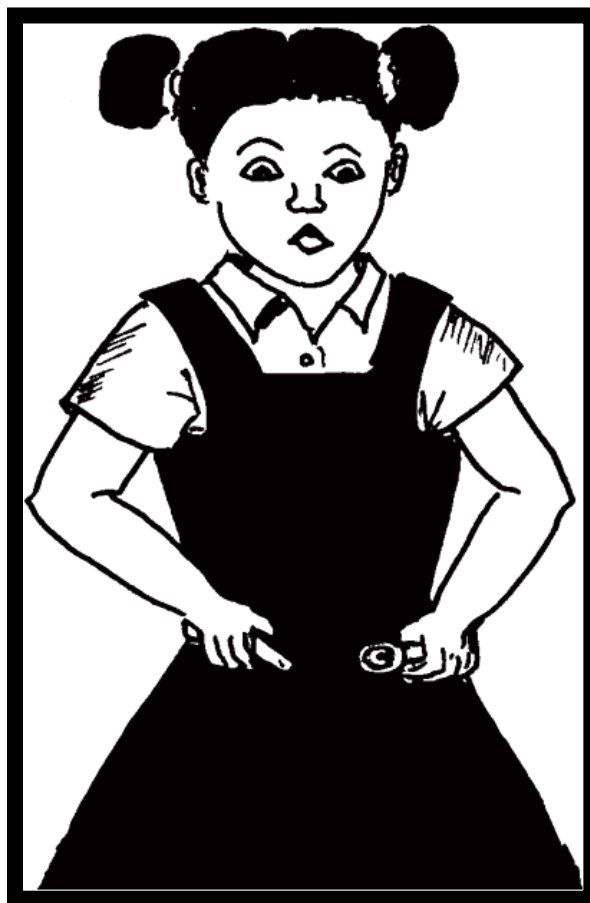

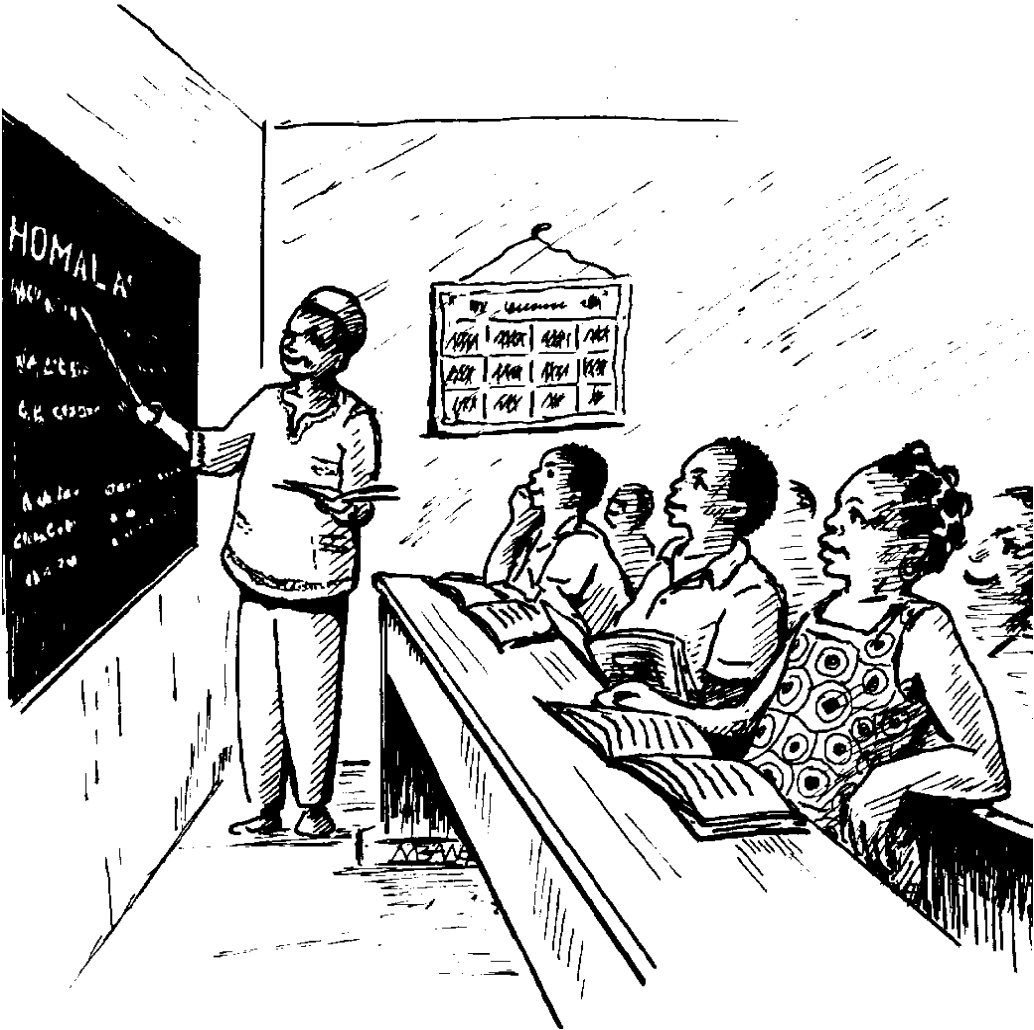

This morning, Aisha wants to dress herself for school.



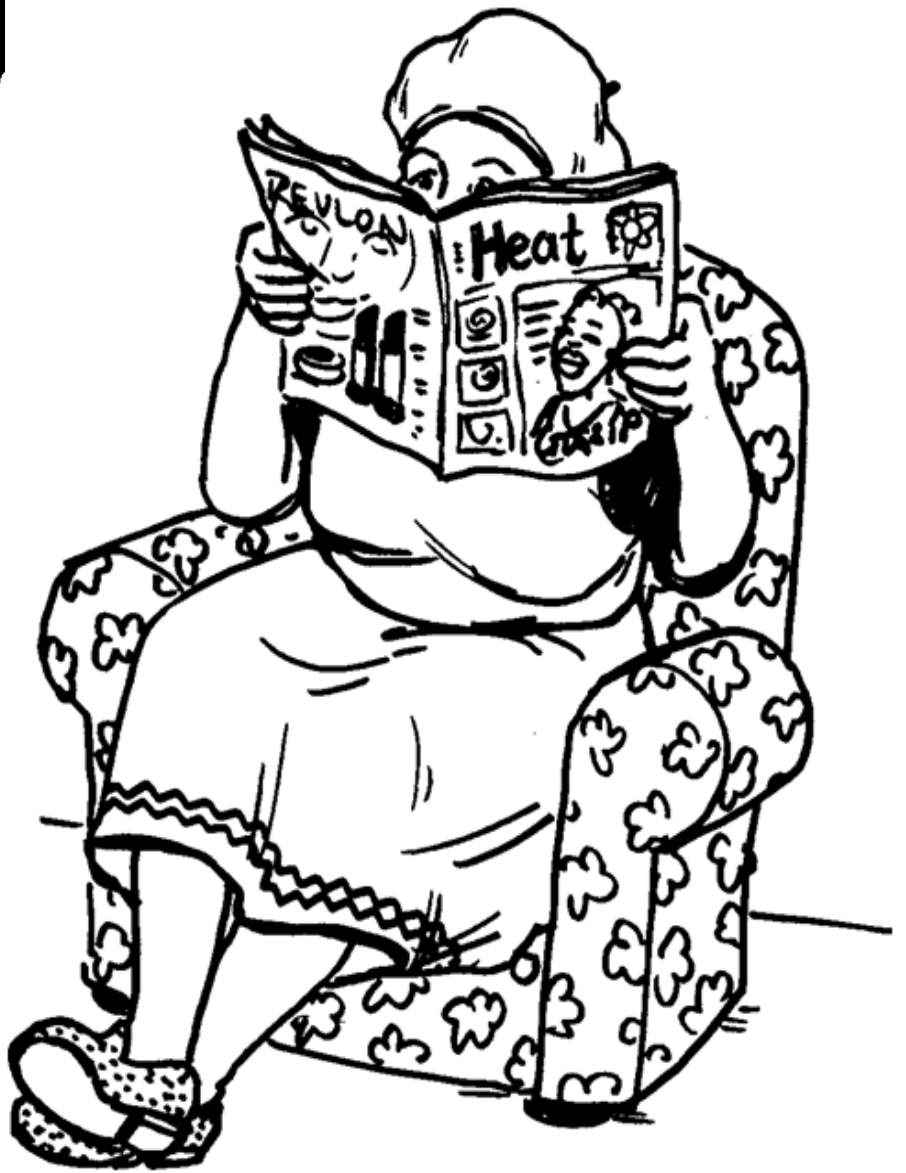
So she asks her Grandma to look at her while she dresses herself.

“Come back with my **bag!** You are not done yet,” says Grandma to Aisha who tries to walk away with Grandma’s bag.



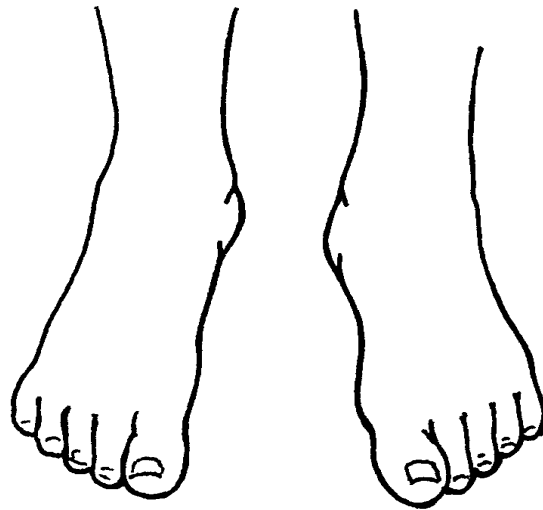
“Good girl. Third, sit down and wear your socks on your feet.”

Aisha takes her baby hat and asks: “How do I look?”



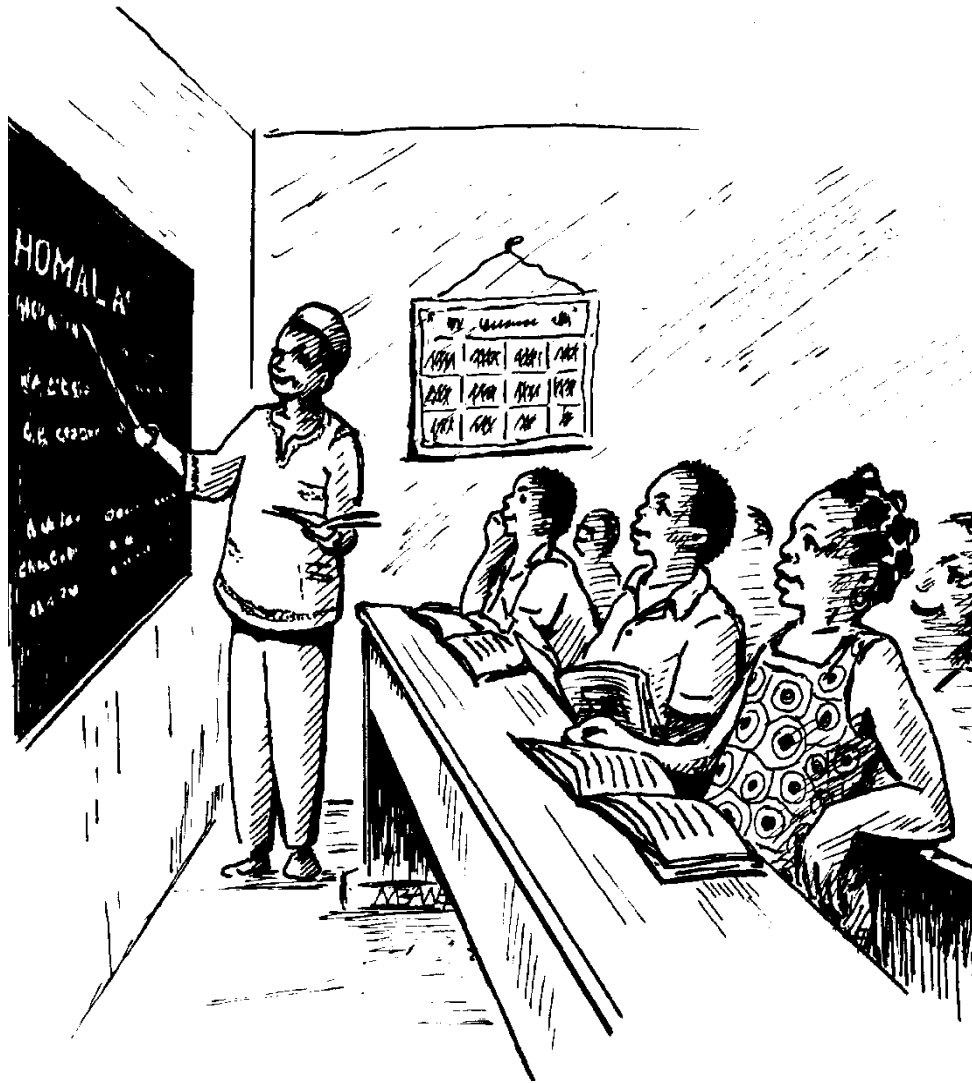
“You look good, my dear,” Grandma says and smiles. “You are now ready for school.”
